

LYNCH MURDER OF SEVEN INNOCENT MEN IN VIRGINIA

A policy of government—Jim Crow enforced through legal lynchings—murdered these seven innocent men in the Virginia electric chair on February 2 and 5.

The Virginia police and courts framed the "Martinsville Seven" — The Supreme Court refused to review the case — President Truman, who was "very familiar" with the case, said he "wasn't seeing anybody" about it.

The Nazi murderers of millions of Jews and American GIs were freed by the U. S. government. But no clemency for the Martinsville Seven, or Lt. Gilbert and the 36 Negro GIs framed in Korea, and no punishment for the police killers of GI John Derrick in New York.
