

## THE SPEAKERS

ESTELLE R. RAMEY, Ph. D., is Professor of Physiology and Biophysics in the Georgetown University Medical Center, and is the first woman Vice President of the Washington, D.C. Heart Association. She has authored over 50 papers and two books on endocrinology, and is becoming nationally known for her presentations of scientific evidence shattering myths of women's physical inferiority. She is a contributor to the first issue of *MS*, the new women's magazine.

JAN MARGOLIS, Ed. M., is Associate Director of the Center for a Voluntary Society in Washington, D.C., a center of the NTL Institute for Applied Behavioral Science. As chairperson of the NTL Task Force on Women, she has developed programs for women focusing on personal growth and professional development. She has conducted training programs to help eliminate institutional racism and institutional sexism in a variety of organizations. She is the author of several publications.
