

"SIGN THE AGREEMENT"

We ask you to sign a petition and to telephone and telegraph the President urging him to sign the Agreement that was arranged by his personal envoy, Mr. Kissinger and Mr. Tho. On October 26, Mr. Kissinger on nationwide television announced to the world that the Agreement had been settled upon and only minor details and the signing needed to be accomplished before there would be peace in Vietnam.

Let us tell Mr. Nixon that we are deeply disturbed by the continued devastating war in Indochina, on the ground and from the air. This is paralleled by the devastation to the life and economy at home. We want this war ended, the military budget lowered and funds transferred to needed domestic problems--lower taxes, pollution measures, drug control, education, health services, day care, jobs, wages, prices. Our needs are of priority as we pay the taxes.

We are also apprehensive about the continued involvement through the build up of "civilian advisors" on military contracts as reported in the Washington Star-News of Nov. 27. We want our American POW's returned home and freedom for the tens of thousands of political prisoners held by the Thieu regime guaranteed. (Time, Nov.)

Let us act now in support of the agreement and ask our Congressmen to add their support. If the agreement is not signed by Jan. 3, 1973, let us begin working for the Congress to cut off funds to continue the Indochina war effort.
