## FUNDING THE PEACE CENTER

- community outreach -

We plan to involve more persons in thought & action for peace by carrying peace education to the community thru all sorts of existing groups. WPC has prepared a comprehensive list of DC peace action groups for distribution on area campuses. This is to inform incoming students of what's happening while stimulating interest among students about the Center itself. - education resources -

Washington Peace Center supplies peace ed. materials for people of all ages designed to supply facts & to encourage people to think thru the peaceful solution of conflicts - personal & group as well as international. Some of these are: study booklets for teachers & pupils in grades 6-12, film-discussions (such as EBC's "Journal of a W.P." & David Achenbrun's great speech on Vietnam), speakers, printed matter for loan or sale (See encl). Free Theater reached some 3,400 persons at Dupont Circle & 5 campuses last year. It is hoped to expand this action with role playing, use of tapes or other variations. - draft counselling -

As a result of our extended effort in this area, the Washington Evening Star of September 18 stated in an article on draft information: "In the District, the most active & respectable draft counselling is offered by the Washington Peace Center, located in the Friends Meeting House, 2111 Florida Ave., NW".

Bill Brubaker, our Head Counselor, counsels now an average of 4 or 5 men daily at the center as compared with the 1 or 2 a day of the last month. This, of course, does not include referrals made to our volunteer counselors in Maryland, Virginia, & D.C.

With this increased demand we need more counselors and a wider range and greater quantity of counselling materials. If you are interested, call Bill, AD4-6211. Contributions to this program would be greatly appreciated. - Bill Brubaker

Greatly expanding demands lead us to the bigger & strengthened peace education program presented in this issue. While it is impossible to do all that our very sick society needs - peace people can & must do more.

Of course this expansion calls for stepping up our frugal budget from \$5000 to \$8000 for 1968-69. Some of us are supporting sacrificially. Our staff are doing more than their part - giving \$15,000 they should have in salaries. One family of 4 are giving \$20 per month. Others have pledged increases or housing for staff. Sustaining givers are sought to give regularly for specific items like salaries, phone, a duplicator, Films & other services will be made more self-supporting. It is hoped that a benefit may be held by a youth or adult group.

DIRECTORS NAME McSORLEY & SAILER

The Board of Directors elected director Richard McSorley to fill Brian Paddock's place on the Exec. Com. & Agnes Sailer as Fund Raising Chair. Several other directors will work with her. Professional advice will be secured & a C.O. to work on fund raising & accounting.

There was general agreement that the Center should condemn Russia's interference in Czechoslovakia. It was decided that the Exec. Secretary should enclose a statement he has signed in the Sept. Newsletter. There was strong support for relief to thousands of starving Biafrans.

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Truong Dinh Hung, 23 yr. old son of Truong Dinh Dzu, civilian runner-up in the 1967 presidential elections in south Vietnam now serving 5 years at hard labor for advocating participation by NLF in gov't.

## UNITED STATES FOREIGN POLICY AND GUATEMALA

In our world made small by improved communications, there is still so much that goes on without our becoming aware of it. We are still largely disinterested in the pains and joys of our fellow-beings, except when events stand out to shock us.

Recently, Mr. John Mein, U.S. Ambassador to Guatemala was shot to death while serving at his post. This was shocking. Our attention turns to that small country in Central America. And we wonder why? I'd like to answer you.

Revolution in Guatemala - Mr. John Mein's death saddens us. But with nary an emotional stir, the news drifted vaguely here about the 4,000 persons killed in Guatemala during the past two years, mainly by right-wing terrorists. Our Ambassador was hardly an innocent bystander.

There is a revolution beginning in Guatemala—a necessary revolution. Land and education needed for human survival, are not appreciably available to 80% of the population. The established government is there by the power of 2% of the people—the wealthy to protect their interests, also to protect the business interests of the U. S.

U.S. Military Aid - That is why the Guatemalan army is aided by U.S. advisors, by helicopters, by planes and arms; why last year 2,000 new policemen were trained, outfitted and salaries paid by the Alliance for Progress. The Ambassador was in Guatemala as an emissary of our country to arrange all these transactions. Hardly an innocent bystander!

U.S. foreign policy is responsible for the image our country presents to other nations. It is ourselves reaching out to other people. It is up to us to determine if it will be an arm in brotherhood or an arm of destruction. Let us not excuse ourselves that we are innocent bystanders. Nine of us will be tried in Federal Court, Baltimore, October 7 for burning draft files in an attempt to stop our country from destroying other nations. Everyone of us must find his way of stretching out his arm in brotherhood. We cannot, we must not stand by with folded arms. - Mrs. Margie Melville (Sept. '68)

For those of us who refuse to abandon the cause of peace out of fear yet hesitate to see violence consume this nation, there is only one alternative: continued non-violent demonstrations. For, in spite of all the protesting that has been done thus far, war is not over; it remains a reality to the women and children who cannot escape.
