

What We Are Accomplishing

By organizing the Youth March and coming to Washington, D.C., we are accomplishing several things:

- The President, the Congress and millions of the public know we have come.
- They know why we have come — to demand:
 - *Massive job programs for youth with decent wages and conditions.
 - *Special efforts to provide jobs where unemployment is worse as in Black and other minority communities.
 - *Passage of the Humphrey-Hawkins Bill to make a start on full employment for everyone.
- They know we will continue to act until our job needs are met and that we are not alone.
- Already we and others have begun to have an effect. Administration and Congressional leaders acknowledge more has to be done on jobs and job training for youth. Their proposed programs are not nearly enough but this March and activities afterward should help make programs bigger and better.

The Humphrey-Hawkins Bill, calling for annual plans to reduce unemployment, passed the House of Representatives by a large margin and is now before the Senate.

- To carry out the Youth March, we have brought together all kinds of people and their organizations. National youth and student, labor, civil rights, religious, women's and other organizations have supported us.

We have shown younger and older, people of all races and religions, can work with one another for our cause. At the city, neighborhood, high school and college levels, thousands of groups have worked together to get us all here because they are deeply concerned with massive youth unemployment. Such wide support for any cause is unusual and needs to be continued.

What We Can Do After The March

- We have come to Washington knowing that the Youth March, Rally, Vigil & Lobby will be very important in the fight for jobs. In itself, it creates tremendous pressure for job programs. But no one expects that all 3 million jobless youth will get jobs as a result of the March alone. Building on the March, however, the on-going pressure for jobs can be many times stronger than before the March.
- When we are back home, we should get together all the groups and individuals who supported the March and figure out what to do next. This should be done in each neighborhood and on a city-wide basis. Summer is coming and millions more youth will be job hunting.
- There are many things we can do. We can support particular youth jobs bills before Congress, the state legislature or city council and seek jobs from existing public programs and neighborhood businesses, and other businesses. We can circulate petitions, write letters, hold disco's and concerts, organize delegations to members of Congress or local officials, pressure candidates in the 1978 elections, develop publicity campaigns on the job plight of youth and demonstrate.
- On the national level, we can sit down with all the national organizations who supported this Youth March and with others and work out how to coordinate national activity for jobs for youth in the future. We can support efforts to transfer funds (Parren Mitchell budget amendment) from the inflated military budget to jobs and other human needs.
- What WE CAN NOT DO is — do nothing, be silent or go our own separate ways. Jobs for everyone and jobs for young people is a human right which must become a reality. It will take all of us and more, continuing to work together to make it so.
