Take Time ...

We lived "uptown" as they say. Belonged to the right clubs, participated in liberal political functions, got invitations to be seen by and with the elite, dined in courses, took extended vacations in the Caribbean...

At 18, I fled. Up and down the California coast, I sought and found refuges to take up my time, exhaust my energies and give meaning to my existence. Like Siddhartha, I searched everywhere except within.

Finally, to make sense of the future, I knew I had to understand the past. Answers were needed--to thousands of questions. At 26, I went first to "find" my mother.

The discussions were endless. It was time to talk about resentments, emotional distance, failed marriages, pressures to conform, disinheritances, middle-class manias, left-wing politics, and a myriad of other things. Sometimes the tears came. At other times it was laughter.

I had judged my mother before, often harshly. But Hansberry spoke of measuring someone right. And, I had given no account to the hills and valleys that had been travelled through. I went home to find my mother and found a friend.

Behind the tough veneer, I discovered a warm and generous heart, a capacity to care without smothering, an unassuming sense of self-understanding, and a willingness to learn as well as teach.

At 32, the pieces are beginning to fit.

Although she struggled to keep us well clothed and well fed, she urged our independence, never believing that we could not succeed. Now, although we're more than 500 miles apart, I can still remember her caring attitude, and her belief in fairness and honesty toward people.

It was the story of a young child's abandonment by both parents into the hands of cruel relatives and uncaring convent school nuns who didn't understand her deafness, her need to be loved or her fierce determination to survive. These tales were generously sprinkled with hilarious anecdotes about her maternal grandmother, a good, loving woman who took her in when all else turned her away.

What two fantastic women! And the stories that held their lives together and mine! These stories were the main course of our daily diet of bouillon soup and kool-aid during our lean years. They made time go faster, hunger subside and made everything, no matter how small, become worthwhile and made problems, no matter how large, surmountable and in years to come a laughing matter. D.C. Hags Report

On March 23, Mary Daly, feminist philosopher and author of Gyn/Ecology: The Metaethics of Radical Feminism (see March newsletter), spoke in an overflowing hall at George Washington University. Close to 450 people, the great majority of them women, heard her. The speech was sponsored by the D.C. Hags, with G.W.U.'s Women's Studies Program, the Lesbian Health and Counseling Center, and the Washington Area Women's Center.

The D.C. Hags are six lesbian-feminist activists who came together to bring Mary Daly to Washington. Since our production experience was limited, we learned as we went along, assisted at every step of the way by many community women with experience, suggestions, and/or expertise in various areas. For this reason, and because our own skills have been developed through working in the D.C. women's community, we believe that we have a responsibility to share information about the planning of this event.

A full account of what we did and how is being prepared and will be donated to the Lesbian Herstory Archives in New York (Box 1258, NY, NY 10001, Tel: 212/874-7232 or 873-9443) so that any woman may review it. Further information is available locally from the Hags, who can be reached through the Women's Center. A summary of our financial record for producing the talk is included here.

During the planning of the event, the Hags, Mary Daly, and the co-sponsors agreed that if money remained after these expenses had been covered, it would be divided among the Lesbian Health and Counseling Center, the Washington Area Women's Center, and Mary Daly. A total of \$812.25 was raised through the \$2 donation requested at the door and one \$35 contribution. After expenses, this left \$427.95, which was distributed as follows: \$135.00 to Mary Daly; \$146.47 to the Lesbian Health and Counseling Center; and \$146.48 to the Washington Area Women's Center.

Women Against Nuclear Power

On June 2 & 3, 1979, the Potomac Alliance, the Virginia Sunshine Alliance, and area anti-nuclear power activists will demonstrate and occupy the North Anna nuclear power plant in Louisa County, Va. This plant is plagued with safety violations, terrifyingly similar to those at the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant in Pa. On Saturday the 2nd, there will be a legal demonstration; Sunday those prepared to do civil disobedience will go onto the plant site and shut down the hazardous North Anna plant. In preparation for the action, participants are asked to attend a non-violence/direct action training session (though the workshops are open to all.)

The threat of nuclear power, nonviolent direct action, and group process are the three main foci of the workshops. The sessions can be one all day workshop or two four-hour sessions. An attempt is being made to put together a women-only training session, probably in May, though no day is yet set. Hopefully, out of this session, one or two women's "affinity groups" (part of the overall structure of the Alliance/action decision making) will be formed, and will participate in the demonstration/action.

RAP GROUP TOPICS

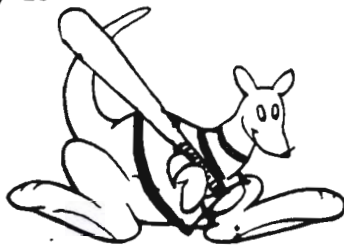

BICYCLE REPAIR COURSE

So far, we have not received enough response to hold the bicycle repair course. As a result we are offering the class again this month. The class will cover proper fit and adjustment, basic tools, general maintenance, flat tire repair, and gear and brake adjustments for 3, 5, and 10-speed bicycles.

Tools will be provided by Chevy Chase Bicycle Service. All women who take the course will receive a 10% discount on purchases at Chevy Chase Bicycle Service.

Class will be limited to 8 women, but enough classes will be scheduled to accommodate everybody who signs up. 3. Participate in classes, workshops, rap groups and sports teams sponsored by the Center. Join or start various projects or groups focusing on counselling, health, recreation, and entertainment.
4. Use the facilities of the Women's Center, which are available for meetings, groups or social occasions on a first-call, first-serve basis.
5. Volunteer and participate in the workings of the Women's Center. Members are encouraged to take an active part in the Center's operations.
6. Receive discounts at Women's Center-sponsored events.
7. Check out books from our small (but growing!) feminist library.
