WOMEN'S NITE OUT RETURNS

NEW BEGINNING

Lo and behold, the magic of Women's Nite Out returns after approximately ten months of silence. The first Women's Nite Out was on April 23, 1977, and featured poetry reading.

Thereafter, the talents of many other fine musicians, poets and dancers graced the upper room of our old Summer School location. What a blow it was to us when we became homeless and needed all our energy to keep the Center and our faith alive. Our need to "do" Women's Nite Out during this period was best expressed through the Women's Nite Out Extravaganza on October 21, 1978. It was unbelievably wonderful to be a part of.

However, the staff realized that now the community needed a "coffeehouse" atmosphere on a regular basis more than ever. So the plans for a future Women's Nite Out began in earnest with sometime in the Fall as a target date. We were not quite sure how we would manage it financially, but we knew we had to try.

The rebirth of Women's Nite Out is due largely to the efforts of the Women's Center volunteers and the financial support of the Rising Women's Coffeehouse Collective.

The Rising Women's Coffeehouse Collective were the creators of the Rising Women's Coffeehouse, which was located on Decatur Place until its closing in 1977. It was one of the finest regular showcases for women's talent in the area and its closing was a great loss to the women's community. They were also known for their yearly cruises in Annapolis on the Harbor Queen.

The Collective has decided to bestow a substantial amount of money to the Women's Center specifically earmarked to the Women's Nite Out program (see opposite column for further details). This sum will not only insure the existence of Women's Nite Out for at least two years, but will enable the Women's Center to expand its past visions into reality.

RISING WOMEN'S STATEMENT

We wish to announce to the women's community our decision to transfer the funds of Rising Women collective to the D.C. Women's Center in hopes that it will help maintain our initial purpose of a "woman's place" by supporting the center and their Women's Nite Out program.

Rising Women collective organized 6 years ago with 13 women to raise funds and support in hope of opening a full-time women's coffeehouse. In those 5 years we became known as D.C.'s number one benefit organizers. We have become business women skilled in mailing, lighting, sound, public relations, booking, finance, patience and endurance. Our credits included the Women's cruise out of Annapolis, dances with Rum Boogie, Hysteria, BeBe K'Roche, concerts featuring Willie Tyson, Casse Culver, Meg Christian, numerous mailings and our opening once a week at Quaker House in 1976. Our last benefit was our Valentine's Day dance in 1977. At that time there were 5 collective members and we were running out of energy. It has been difficult for us to decide to disband the Rising Women collective and our dream of a women's coffeehouse but we feel a part of it can be realized through the Center's Women's Nite Out. We wish to thank the community for their support over the years and say that it has been a rich and rewarding experience for us in many ways. We look forward to seeing you at the opening of Women's Nite Out.



WIND DISSOLVES

July, 1979

Dear Friends,

We have decided that Women in Distribution must be dissolved. This decision has been extremely difficult, but we feel that the closing of Women in Distribution is the best alternative available to us.

We know there will be many questions surrounding our closing WIND and we would like to answer some of them now. We will try to explain briefly what our experience and thoughts have been and how we have come to this decision.

Three main factors have influenced our decision to dissolve Women in Distribution: the financial position of WIND; the activities of the small and women's presses; and the activities of the major publishers.

First and foremost is our financial position. In many ways we were successful. Each year between 1975 and 1978 our sales doubled. Our list of titles increased from 30 in 1975 to 600 in 1979. The number of bookstores and libraries that regularly order from us rose steadily from 25 in 1975 to 600 in 1979.

Despite this apparent success, we continued to lose money each year. The time involved in processing, packing, recording orders, accounting to and corresponding with publishers, in collecting payments, in reviewing new titles, writing copy, designing and producing catalogues, increased as WIND grew. Our expenses increased (Postage, utilities, supplies). Some of our expenses increased because of our growth in size (e.g. insurance). WIND's percentage was not enough to cover these increases. In 1978 we raised the cost of our service to new publishers. This decreased our losses somewhat, but was not enough to keep up with rising costs.

We saw several possible courses of action and wanted to know which one(s) to take in order to bring us closer to breaking even. The alternatives included: raise the cost of distributing through WIND to all publishers (we planned to do this effective 8/79); decrease salaries and reduce the number of women working at WIND (presently three women full time, one part time); move to a smaller location; expand WIND further by taking on new loans or selling shares (this included the possibility of expanding beyond "women's books" to other small press books, and more mass paperbacks of the "best-seller" variety); and continue as we are, but try to get financing from grants, private donations, etc.

After extensive work sessions with our accountants, we had to accept the conclusion that none of our proposed alternatives would result in making WIND a viable, self-sufficient operation in the foreseeable future. It became clear to us that the only responsible thing to do, would be to dissolve WIND, and to dissolve it quickly, before the summer brings further losses.

All in all, we are not inspired to think that we should keep operating through next year.

The financial position of WIND was not the only factor in our decision. WIND's future looked all the more bleak because of the difficult time small and women's presses are having trying to survive. The activities of the major publishers are making it more difficult to sell the work of the independent presses.

Three years ago, many chain bookstores and non-counter-culture bookstores started to acknowledge the demand for books by, for and/or about women. Their usual suppliers (trade publishers and distributors) did not have much to offer in this area, so they were eager to find sources. Many of them came to WIND. Since then, the large publishers have recognized the market that exists for "women's books", and have published many books to sell to that market. Some of these books, covering everything from lesbian sexuality to women in corporations, have been good, and some have been terrible. The important point (from our point of view) is that in the eyes of most buyers for "straight" bookstores, the area of "women's books" and "alternative lifestyle books" is now being covered by the trade publishers. It is also true that less and less shelf space is being given to small press books in women's bookstores. This is true for two reasons: many good books are coming from the trade and the women's bookstores want to give their customers a good selection of books; and in order to remain in business the women's bookstores must be competitive with the regular bookstores.

We feel this phenomenon is disastrous, not only in the short run, for the growth of WIND and other alternative distributors and publishers, but in the long run, for freedom of speech and expression. When the trade publishers feel the "fad" of women's liberation has died down, it will be very easy for them to stop publishing "women's books". We have all seen the "fads" within the framework of "women's books" that have been used. We have all heard the stories of the different New York publishers who are looking for good "incest" books one year or "self-defense" books another year--whatever will sell. This year gay books are coming out in (relatively) large numbers from the trade publishers. But will they publish books on lesbian mothers' custody fights? We have all heard about "concentration" in the book industry. Publishing companies are merging with and being bought out by conglomerates such as ITT, Gulf and Western, and CBS. It is alarming to think of these corporations having complete control of what we can find at our local bookstore/library.

We do not like to be doomsday predictors, but it seems to us that the situation is very serious.

We are writing this in a semi-state of shock and may not be answering all the questions that will arise. However, along with getting all the books/records sent back to publishers, we wanted to tell those of you who have supported us what our thinking was in this painful decision.

LETTER

I am a Black lesbian and I am concerned about the places we are able to meet and socialize with each other. I feel that all lesbians should stick together and we should have our own places to go to.

I am particularly concerned with recent events at the Phase. A friend of mine was there, and she told me a fight broke out between a white woman and two Black women. The police were called and the two Black women were taken to jail. I don't know all the details, but it doesn't sound right to me. No matter what the situation, it seems to me that the women should have dealt with the problem, not the cops.

White lesbians are often saying to me that they want more Black lesbians to get involved in things and participate in social events. Although I see very few Black lesbians at concerts, dances, etc., I can really say that at the last Women's Center dance everyone made me feel very welcome and comfortable. I wish this situation could be extended to the clubs, especially the Phase.

The point is--must we do battle with each other? There is something very sick, very sad and very insane about women oppressing other women.

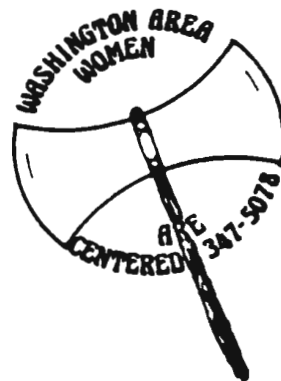
